



At the time of her intake to the Choices Program at Peaceful Solutions Counseling, she had six months of abstinence and was working part-time. During her time in counseling, she maintained abstinence from all mood-altering chemicals, graduated from high school, and moved into her own apartment.




Provides free and confidential access to non-emergency health and human services information and referral, via phone, text, chat or on-line database.

THE HOUSING TASK FORCE was created by The Wausau Police Department in response to the 2019 loitering ordinance. It was transferred to United Way Leadership in March of 2020.

Through a newly developed Outreach Case Management strategy in 2020, The Housing Task Force has assisted eighteen individuals with housing, reunification with family members, or assisted individuals with entering into community programming.

Supports a diversion pilot "Tiers of Support" to integrate community-based services for students and families that address challenging behaviors and truancy with supportive rather than punitive approaches.

- Hosts a "Student Hiring Fair" where local businesses meet with local students to accept applications, conduct interviews and establish better bridges to local youth employment.
- Hosts a Professional Development Day annually in August to build skills in individuals who work with youth in our schools and agencies.


