Rebecca's Closet was founded by Kathy Volkmann, Vice President of Cloverbelt Credit Union. When Kathy learned that a social service caseworker was looking for children's clothing to help a family in need, she offered some items that her niece, Rebecca Cleveland, had outgrown. This brought attention to the fact that many other families in the community were also in need of children's clothing, toys, diapers and other essentials. Kathy started collecting these items in her home. Soon the project outgrew that space and Rebecca's Closet moved into a building owned by Cloverbelt Credit Union, where the program continued to grow for eight years. In November of 2013, United Way Women United took over Rebecca's Closet in efforts to help continue to grow the program. In 2015 over 10,000 infant, toddler and school aged clothing items went out to low income families in our community.
